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Study circles in Slovenia

- Study circles are small learning groups which learn regularly and systematically. They join forces and share benefits.
- Their work is **documented**. **Mentors lead** the process of learning, but all participants take their role and responsibility for it.
- Study circles are therefore the form of searching, improving and exchanging knowledge, skills and values as well.



Study circles in Slovenia

- The outcome is individual strengthening on the one hand and empowerment of communities on the other hand. The "added value" are not only new knowledge or its new interpretations, but also interpersonal relations.
- Study circles in Slovenia are characterized by accessibility, diversity and creativity, as well as by the satisfaction provided by voluntary work.
- The network of excellent mentors is crucial.

Slovenia Forest Service and Study circles



- Taking place since 1999 (20 years tradition!)
- In most Slovenian regions (some very active, some less, depending on mentors)
- In the beginning 10 15 study circles per year, recently around 5 per year (2016, 2017)
- Wide range of forest-related topics (forest management for forest owners, forest ecology, cultural heritage, forest tourism, etc.

Slovenia Forest Service and Study circles



- Cca 5-12 participants
- Cca 5 meetings, 25 hrs learning in total
- The participants dictate the content, ways of learning and rhythm themselves
- Principles: freedom, cooperation, active participation, volunteering
- Learning through experience of participants

Slovenia Forest Service and Study circles (advantages)



- Study circles encourage personal and professional growth and raise selfconfidence of participants
- Founding and strengthening connections between participants (and basis for other connecions! Societies, etc.)
- Actively changing environment (events, media publications)

Slovenia Forest Service and Study circles (advantages)



- Involving different interested stakeholders from the local environment -> relations can benefit professional tasks
- Facilitating communication, teamwork, and forestry education of forest owners
- Supplementing and enchancing formal SFS knowledge transfer activities.



Study circle: "Pragozdovi"



Aims:

- To get to know the secrets of old-growth forests in Slovenia, visit them and try to understand the natural processes that take place in there.
- To **experience old-growth forests** by visiting them and spending time there.

Outputs:

- Visited and studied 5 Old-growth forests (forest reserves)
- Made reports about each forest (includes history, stand characteristics, list of relevant research, etc...)
- Prepared a **popular science e-book** about their activities.
